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Legal Compliance in Government Procurement From Procedural Soundness to Decision Governance

Government procurement is among the areas most closely linked to the management of public funds, as it involves financial and contractual decisions that give rise to direct or future legal obligations on federal entities. In this context, legal compliance emerges as a fundamental pillar that is not confined to the procedural validity of actions but extends to the integrity of the financial decision itself.

Legal compliance does not mean mere formal observance of legal provisions. Rather, it denotes a conscious and systematic commitment to the governing legislative and regulatory framework applicable to the procurement cycle, ensuring the legality of the decision, the soundness of the financial obligation, and accountability. This compliance derives its legal authority from the federal Government Procurement Law and its Executive Regulations, which constitute the legislative framework governing all stages of procurement, from planning through to execution.

Compliance as a Governance Function

Under leading government practices, legal compliance in procurement is viewed as a governance function rather than a post-control mechanism. Government procurement:

- Represents a significant proportion of public expenditure;
- Involves multiple discretionary powers; and
- Creates financial commitments that may extend across multiple fiscal years.

Accordingly, any deficiency in compliance should not be regarded as a purely procedural breach, but as a governance risk that may affect the legality and integrity of financial decision-making.

Legal Compliance and Administrative Decision-Making

Under sound government practices, legal compliance is not viewed as a constraint on administrative decision-making, but rather as a tool for guiding it and enhancing its quality. A legally compliant decision is more defensible, more sustainable, and less vulnerable to misinterpretation or challenge, thereby directly contributing to the efficiency of public spending and the integrity of institutional performance.

Compliance Across the Procurement Cycle

Legal compliance in procurement is achieved by viewing the process as an integrated and continuous cycle, encompassing the following stages:

- Pre-procurement: Verifying the existence of a clear legal basis for the identified need, the availability of approved budgetary appropriations, and the legality of the selected procurement method in accordance with applicable legislation.
- During procurement: Ensuring the integrity of competition, the clarity of evaluation criteria, and the proper documentation of administrative decisions, in a manner that reflects fairness and transparency of the process.
- At contracting: Confirming the clarity of contractual obligations, the balance of rights and obligations, and linking the contract to duly conferred legal authority, without treating the contract itself as a source of such authority.
- Post-contract: Regulating amendments and extensions, preventing the creation of unauthorized financial obligations, and ensuring continued compliance with the federal procurement legislative framework.

Common Pitfalls to Be Avoided

Practical experience demonstrates that the most significant areas of deficiency include:

- Excessive reliance on contractual amendments without a clear legal basis;
- Confusion between urgency and legal necessity;
- Treating administrative approval, in itself, as sufficient legal cover; and
- Reliance on established practice instead of the governing legal text.

Awareness of these practices constitutes an essential element in strengthening legal compliance and governance.

The Role of Financial Officers and Procurement Specialists

The role of financial officers and procurement specialists is not limited to the execution of procedures. It extends to a preventive function that includes:

- Verifying legal compliance;
- Flagging potential legal risks; and
- Seeking specialized advice in cases of ambiguity or conflict.
